SOLUTIONS

PUZZLE 1. 26. Rxb5!! Carlsen's in-game move 26. e6+? was a huge strategic error, as Black's b5-knight coordinates with the light-squared bishop to threaten to capture both of White's c-pawns. After 26. ... Kb7 27. Rxb5 and White cannot transpose moves, due to 27. ... Bxb5 28. Bxd5 Qf5!. 26. ... Bxb5 27. Bxd5 with compensation. (Carlsen – Rapport, World Blitz [analysis], 2022) PUZZLE 2. 31. ... Nxc3! With his 31. ... Nc7, Rapport missed a simplification tactic! If White does not capture, then Black covers the important b5- and d5-squares, defanging Qb4-b5+. 32. Qxc3 Be4 33. Bxe4 Qxe4+ when White has no threats, Black will scoop the f7-pawn, and be up a clean exchange.

(Carlsen – Rapport, World Blitz [analysis], 2022) PUZZLE 3. 37. ... g6!! Black's only way to hold the draw! Rapport chose to overprotect the d5-pawn with 37. ... Rhd8? in the game. 38. hxg6 White has nothing better. After 38. a6+? Ka8 White is not in time to play Qb5-d7, as in the game, due to Black's mate threat: 39. hxg6 Qe4 40. g7 h5++. 38. ... Qe4! 39. Qd7+ 39. a6+? Ka8 40. Qd7 Qxg6+! 39. ... Ka6! 40. g7 Qg6+ and an equal position (Carlsen – Rapport, World Blitz [analysis], 2022) PUZZLE 4. 39. f3!! White threatens f7-f8-Q followed by Qb5-xd5 mate. Carlsen blundered in the game with 39. f8-Q, missing Black's resource after 39. ... Rxf8 (39. ... g6!) 40. Qd7 Rxf4+!. Without this move, Black was busted. 40. hxg6 h5+ 41. Kg5 Qxf3 Black can

cover the d5-pawn after all, but there is no perpetual after 42. g7+-. (Carlsen – Rapport, World Blitz [analysis], 2022) PUZZLE 5. Rapport correctly evaluates the resulting endgame and played. 49. ... Qg4+! 50. Qxg4 hxg4+ 51. Kxg4 b5! and Black is fast enough to win only after this move. (Carlsen – Rapport, World Blitz, 2022) PUZZLE 6. 63. ... Rc6+! Rapport missed the cleanest win by playing 63. ... Qe4+? 64. Kg5 Qe3+??. Black could still win with 64. ... Rb8!, taking time to cover the threat of Qf7-b7 mate, and Black wins as 65. g8=Q Qg2+! is a nice X-ray. 64. Kf5 Qf2+ Black may look like he has stalemate tricks after 65. Ke5 Qxf7 but he had one pawn too many. 66. g8=Q+ Qxg8++. (Carlsen – Rapport, World Blitz [analysis], 2022)
