


REMEMBERING IM SILMAN

Long before the days of ChessKid. com and Gotham Chess videos, most of us had to learn chess from books and articles. One of America's most beloved teachers, IM Jeremy Silman, passed away on September 21, 2023, at the age of 69. To honor the legendary author, this week's puzzles all highlight important tactical themes from his games.

In this **example**, Silman combines several themes to force a win with **35. d6! Rd8 36. Qf6** When the clever point is that the rook is overloaded after **36. ... Qxd6?? 37. Re8+** removes the defender with a decoy. As a **bonus**, after **36. ... Rf8 37. Re7**

Qd8 38. d7 b5, can you find White's knockout blow?





SOLUTIONS

(1) 35. ... Rxa7 An equal trade? No! A deflection! 36. Rxa7 Qb1+ Just a check? No! Forcing a double attack! 37. Kg2 Qe4+ 38. Bf3 Qxe6 Black went on to win. (Gilbert – Silman, Los Angeles, 1991) 2) 56. ... e2+! Promotion tactics do not always involve forcing moves. 57. Kd2 Note: 57. Ke1 Ng2+ 58. Kf2 e1=Q+ is no different. 57. ... Ng2! After 58. Rxd3 e1=Q+ Black won shortly. (Peters – Silman, Santa Monica, 1990)

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3) 16. Nxe5 White sets up a skewer, as 16. Rb5 fails to 16. ... Nxf3+! 16. ... Nxe5 17. Rb5 Nxd3 18. Rxc5 Nxc5 and White went on to win. (Silman – Zavodnick, Los Angeles, 1988) 4) 26. Rxg6+! hxg6 27. Qxg6+ A nice use of the pin! 27. ... Kf8 After 27. ... Kh8, I like 28. Qh5+ Kg8 29. Rf3! with Rf3-g3 to follow. 28. Qh7! There is no way to stop mate. (Silman – Allen, Portland, 1985) 5) 30. Qxf5! A nice intermezzo. Not the greedy 30. dxc7?? (or 30. Rxf5?? Ra1+, mating),

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losing to 30. ... Rxf1 mate. 30. ... gxf5 31. dxc7 Winning. (Silman – Syrett, Monterrey, 1977)
6) 15. Bb6! Sneaky! 15. ... Qxb6
16. Bxd7 regains the piece, with interest! 16. ... Qc7 17. Bxc8 Rxc8
18. Rc1 White went on to win. (Silman – Thompson, Phoenix, 1990) Bonus) 39. Rxf7! Qxf6 40. Rxf6! forces 40. ... Rd8 when White wins the endgame with extra pawns after 41. Rxg6+ Kf7 42. Rb6. (Silman – Lawless, San Francisco, 1982)
