

SOLUTIONS

PUZZLE 1. 18. g6! White threatens h5-h6. 18. ... h6 19. Bxh6 The bishop is untouchable thanks to g6-g7+. 19. ... f5 And now, the final breakthrough: 20. Bxg7+! Kxg7 21. h6+ Kxh6 22. g7 Rg8 23. exf5 Nf6 24. Qe3+ and Black had seen enough. (Van Foreest – Radjabov, Gabala, 2023) PUZZLE 2. 48. ... Be2+ Black wins a key pawn.49. Ke3 Or 49. Kg2 Bg4+ 50. Kg1 Bxf5 51. gxh4+ Kxh4 52. exf5 Kg5 53. Rf3 Rd2 with a won endgame. 49. ... hxg3 50. Ra8 Bc4 51. Ra7 Rc3+ 52. Kd2 Rd3+ 53. Ke1 Kf4 54. h4 Re3+ 55. Kd2 g2 56. Ra1 Bf1 and White resigned. (Van Foreest – Arjun, Gabala, 2023) PUZZLE 3. 44. ... Bc3! Here comes the bride! Black's d-pawn is mighty fast, and the weakness

on b3 just accelerates matters. **45. Re3 d4 46. Rf3 Bxb3 47. Ne4 Rf8** and **White resigned**, as the rook is effectively trapped. (Gelfand – Radjabov, Gabala, 2023) **PUZZLE 4.** White's king must head towards the h-pawn. But to g3 or g4? One loses, one draws. **78. Kg4!** Instead, after **78. Kg3?? Ng5 79. Bh1 e4 80. Kf2 Ke5, White resigned. 78.... Ng5** Instead, if Black tries 78.... Nf4, he cannot play ...e5-e4, while other moves hang the h-pawn: 79. Kg3 Ke3 80. Bc6 e4 81. Bb7 draws; 78.... h2 does not save the pawn, as 79. Kg3 nabs it. **79. Kxg5! e4 80. Kf4 e3 81. Kg3 e2 82. Kf2 Kd3 83. Ba6+** should **draw.** (Gelfand – Abasov, Gabala, 2023, analysis) **PUZZLE 5. 44.... Rd1!** Black can disrupt White's king enough to keep alive. Not 44.... Rd5 45. Qa1!

guarding against perpetual. **45. Nd4** The only try was 45. g5, when after 45. ... Nxg5 46. Ne5 (not 46. Qxg5? Rg1+ winning White's queen) 46. ... Kg8 47. Kg2 Rd5, Black still holds. **45. ... Rg1+ 46. Kh3** White must settle, as 46. Kf4?? g5+ parts with the queen. **46. ... Rh1+ 47. Kg3 Rg1+ 48. Kh3 Rh1+ 49. Kg3** with a **draw**. (Vidit – Arjun, Gabala, 2023) **PUZZLE 6. 41. ... fxg4!** Instead, Black played **41. ... c3** when White erred with **42. e6??**. Correct was 42. g5!, eliminating Black's h-pawn. For instance 42. ... hxg5 43. fxg5 Kxg5 44. Kf3 c2 45. Bc1+ holds. Instead, Black was winning after **42. ... fxg4** with the idea of ...h6-h5+, although White held. **42. Kxg4 h5+ 43. Kf3 Nh6** Or 43. ... Kf5, winning. (Arjun – Radjabov, Gabala, 2023, analysis)
