


QUIET MOVES FROM THE K-12

This week's exercises all come from the **2024 National High School (K-12) Championships**. They also have a theme in common. Every position begins with a somewhat "quiet" move. This could be a trade of equal material, or a threat that does not come with a check or capture. All of these moves are to overlook when blunder-checking.

In our **example**, White really wants to break in with Bd3xh7+. So he plays the straightforward **21**. **Ba3!** and it turns out there is no way to defend. Black played **21**. ... Nf6 22. exf6 Qxf7 23. Bxf8 Rxf8 **24**. Bxh7+ Kh8 25. Bg6 and Black

resigned nine moves later in Luo – Pisan, Baltimore, 2024.





SOLUTIONS

1) Black trades into a winning pawn endgame: 50. ... Qb2+ and Black wins. (Salbinaz – Padhye, Baltimore, 2024) 2) White begins with a trade that is easy to dismiss. 18. Bxh6! Bxh6 19. Nf6+ There's an Exchange! 19. ... Kf8 20. Nxd7+ and Black resigned shortly. (Chasin – Hua, Baltimore, 2024) 3) 47. ... g5 This move puts White in zugzwang. 48. Ke3 Kc4 49. Ke4 Kb3! Black's pawns are better: 50. Kd5 Kxa3 51. Kc6

Kxb4 52. Kxc7 Or 52. d5 Kc4 also wins. 52. ... Kc4! and Black wins. (Hsiao – Vanapalli, Baltimore, 2024) 4) 15. ... Bxf3 Again, Black begins with a trade, giving up a powerful bishop "just" to damage White's pawn structure. 16. gxf3 Bxh2+ Or not! 17. Kxh2 Qh4+ 18. Kg1 Qg5+ 19. Kh2 Rf6 and White resigned. (Grimaldi – Raghav, Baltimore, 2024) 5) Black's best move was a check that appeared to lose material. 27. ... Ng3+! Instead, after

27. ... Kxg7?? Black won after 28. Nd1??, hanging 28. ... Qf1 mate. But White could have held with 28. Rg1!. 28. hxg3 Kxg7 and ... Re8-h8 mate is coming. (Yehamandram – Cruz, Baltimore, 2024, analysis) 6) 29. Be3 Too slow to be forcing, as Black's rook can move, right? 29. ... Rc2 30. Ba4 But now it moves again? 30. ... Rc4. If 30. ... Re2, then 31. Bd1 also wins. 31. Bb3 Forced material gain without a check or capture. (Kumar – Modzelewski, Baltimore, 2024)
