



SOLUTIONS

PUZZLE 1. 62. ... Ng3+ White has several replies, but the h2-rook is misplaced after all of them. Instead, Black played 62. ... Bf4? and eventually lost from this equal position (see Puzzle 6). 63. Kf2 Or 63. Kd2 is no different: 63. ... Bxe3+ 64. Kxe3 Nf1+ still wins. 63. ... Bxe3+ 64. Kxg3 Or 64. Kxe3 Nf1+ still nabs the rook. 64. ... Bf4+ wins the rook. (Paschall – Dettmann, Krakow, 2024, analysis) PUZZLE 2. 24. ... Ra4! 25. Bd2 Although 25. Nc7? was played, after 25. ... Rxa5 26. Nxd5 Ne5! Black was winning. 25. ... Nb4 allows Black to untangle, thanks to the tempo on the loose dark-squared bishop. (Hulme – Marinello, Krakow, 2024) PUZZLE 3. 21. c5! Defending the

d3-pawn with 21. Be4? Bxh3 favored Black. 21. ... Qxc5
Note that 21. ... Qa5 does get out of danger, either: 22. Nc4
Qxc5 23. Rxe5! equalizes after 23. ... Rxe5 24. Rxe5 Rxe5
25. Nxe5 Qxe5 26. Qxb4, regaining the piece! 22. Rc1
White can force a repetition: 22. ... Qd6 23. Nc4 Qc5
24. Na3 with a draw. (Koganov – Townsend, Krakow,
2024, analysis) PUZZLE 4. 38. ... Rd7! Prophylaxis! In the
game, Black was in for a cold shower after 38. ... d3? 39.
Rxa7 d2 40. Rcc7! when there is no way to stop a perpetual check along the seventh rank. 39. Rxf6 What else?
39. ... d3 White can call it a day. (Lampe – Paschall, Krakow,
2024, analysis) PUZZLE 5. 45. ... Rg5+ This counterintuitive
check is the only drawing move. 46. Kxh6 Or 46. Kh4 Rg8!
