


LOOSE PIECES AT THE OLYMPIAD

This week's puzzles continue our series from the **45th FIDE Olympiad**. Under enough pressure, even top players leave their pieces hanging, loose, or under-defended. Each exercise follows the adage of **Loose Pieces Drop Off** (LPDO).

In our **example**, we see the importance of protecting your pieces. First, White won a piece with **36. Rxc8 Bxc8 37. Bxe4** but Black had been counting on **37.... Re5** to skewer White's two hanging bishops when Rb6-b4 is unplayable. But Black still has a loose piece of his own, so White escapes with tempo after **38. Bb7 Rxe3 39. Bxc8**

and then White went on to win later in Sarana – Juarez Flores.





SOLUTIONS

1) A double attack! 39. ... Nd4 40. Qd5 Nxc6 Since Black's queen is defended, this wins the bishop. (Ivanchuk – Cheng, Budapest, 2024) 2) 34. gxf5+ Removing the guard! 34. ... Kxf5 35. R3xe4 Black's e8-rook is not able to defend. (Albornoz Cabrera – Shirov, Budapest, 2024) 3) 19. ... d3 Interference! White's knight goes from "loose" to "hanging." 20. cxd3 Qxb5 and Black wins. (Prudente – Fluvia Poyatos,

Budapest, 2024) 4) 24. Rxd4! The key here is that Black's d8-rook is under-protected. Note that 24. Bxd4? fails, as 24. ... hxg4 25. Bxe5 Rxd2! is the key "tempo move" 26. Rxd2 Bxe5 and Black is equal. 24. ... Rxd4 If 24. ... Nxg4?, then 25. Rxd8 wins. 25. Be6+ The point! We escape the attackers on the g4-square with tempo, then regain the rook. 25. ... Nf7 26. Bxd4 Bxd4 27. Rxd4 White is up a full bishop. (Nabaty – Sindarov, Budapest, 2024) 5) 18.

Rxe4 White removes the guard of the c5-bishop. 18. ... Bxf2+ While 18. ... dxe4 comes with tempo on the f3-knight, 19. Nxc5 comes with tempo on Black's queen, so 19. ... Qb6 20. Nxe4 and White wins. 19. Kxf2 dxe4 20. Qxb4 exf3 21. Be3 The two pieces are better than the rook. (Vokhidov – Cupid, Budapest, 2024) 6) 34. ... Qb2! Black "forks" the hanging rook with the threat of mate. 35. Rc2 Bc3+! 36. Ke2 Qxb5 mate. (Hapala – Kairbekova, 2024)
