

## SOLUTIONS

PUZZLE 1. 37. Rc6! Not 37. Rxa6? Kxc2 with equal chances.
37. ... Kxc2 After 37. ... Kb4 38. Rxa6 is winning, as Black cannot take the c2-pawn anymore. 38. Nb6+ Kxd3 39.
Nd5 (Kaplan – Oh, Maryland, 2024) PUZZLE 2. 37. ... Rh1!
Black missed a shot for a huge upset! Instead, after 37. ... Qb1 38. Rd8 the game was balanced and White later won. 38. Bd5 The rook is untouchable: 38. Kxh1 Qh3+ 39. Kg1 Re1 mate. 38. ... Ree1 39. Rxg6+ Kh7! 40. Rh6+ Kg7 41. Qd4+ f6 The checks run out. (Feng – Yadawad, Maryland, 2024, analysis) PUZZLE 3. 24. ... Qg7! Accurate defense! White over-pressed with: 25. Bh6? Best was 25. Qd1 Qg6 26. Qd4 Qg7 allowing White a repetition.



25. ... Qxh6 26. Rxf5+ Kg8 27. Rg5+ Ng7 Black is winning. (Murgescu – Underwood, Maryland, 2024) PUZZLE 4.
34. ... fxg6! The winning recapture. Black allowed
34. ... hxg6 35. Qd8+ Kh7 36. Qh4+ Kg8 37. Qd8+ Kh7
38. Qh4+ Kg8 39. Qd8+ draw. 35. Qd8+ Kf7 36. Qc7+ Kf6!
37. Qg7+ Kxf5 The critical point is that White has no lasting attack here. (Ramnath – Liu, Maryland, 2024, analysis)
PUZZLE 5. 59. Kh2!! White steps out of tricky ... Re2el+ ideas. White lost after 59. g4 a3 60. g5 a2 61. Rc8
Rxe3 62. g6 Rxf3 when the g-pawn is stuck. 59. ... a3
If 59. ... Rd8 then White keeps activating the king with
60. Kg3 and Kg3-f4 followed by g2-g4. Again, 60. ... a3
61. Rc7 is still a motif. 60. Rc8 Note 60. Rc7 is equivalent.

60. ... a2 If 60. ... Rxe3 61. Rb8+ Ka5 62. Ra8+ Kb6 (or 62. ... *Kb4 63. Rb8*+ repeats) 63. Rxa3, the two pawns give White enough play. 61. Rb8+ Ka3 62. Nc4+! Bxc4 63. Rc3+ Ka4
64. Rxc4+ White draws. (Wu – Gao, Maryland, 2024, analysis)
PUZZLE 6. 21. Bxg5 White launches a committal attack.
21. ... Bxg5 22. Nxe6 fxe6 23. Qxe6+ Kf8 24. Bg6 Rc7
25. Qxd6+! White dodged a bullet after playing 25. Rfe1 when Black missed 25. ... Re7! Instead, Black played
25. ... Bc6 26. Qxd6+ Re7 27. Re6 and White won shortly. But now 26. Qf5+ Bf6 is okay. 25. ... Re7 26. Rcd1! Ignoring Rc1-e1 to instead go for the back rank! 26. ... Bc6 27. Rfe1 Using both rooks. 27. ... Be8! 28. Rd5! Lateral mobility proves decisive! (Yin – Roberts, Maryland, 2024, analysis)
