


FIDE WORLD RAPID & BLITZ, PT. 8

This week's puzzles come from 13-year-old WFM Megan Althea Paragua's games at the **2024 FIDE World Rapid & Blitz Championship**. The New York native won gold medals in the FIDE Cadet World Rapid & Blitz last year, and had stellar results against adults in December.

In our **example**, Paragua wriggled out of danger with **40....e5!** clearing the e6-square for her pinned knight with tempo on the d4-knight. Now **41. bxc5** is best, since 41. Ne2 Ne6 breaks the pin. But Black remains ahead materially: **41....exd4 42. Bxd4 Bxd4 43. Qxd4**

Bc6 when White is down a piece for two pawns in Nutakki – Paragua.





SOLUTIONS

1) 60. Rhxf6+ White is winning, but it's nice to have technique.

Black resigned and 60. Rfxf6+ was equivalent. (Paragua – Zhu, New York, 2024) 2) 59. ... Qxf1+ The most precise. Black played 59. ... Qe7 and won later. 60. Qxf1 a1=Q 61. Qxa1 Rxa1+ Black's rook-up. (Munkhzul – Paragua, New York, 2024) 3) 66. Rc7+ Kg8 Black played 66. ... Ke8 when Ke5-f6 still wins, but White has more options here,

and chose 67. Rg7 Ne4 68. Rxg6 when Black's pawns fall. 67. Kf6
White wins: 67. ... f4 68. Kxg6 The mate threat forces 68. ... Kf8 when 69. Rf7+ nabs the f-pawn. (Paragua – Stanford, New York, 2024) 4) 34.

Be5 White uses all her pieces. 34. ...
Bg7 35. Bxf6 Here, Black resigned, as 35. ... Bxf6 36. f8=Q+ wins Black's queen. (Paragua – Mammadzada, New York, 2024) 5) 56. Qf5+ A less trivial simplification. 56. ... Qxf5+
57. Kxf5 With a pawn on the fourth

rank, opposition in front of pawn wins. 57. ... Kf8 58. Kf6 Kg8 59. Ke7 Kg7 60. f5 Kh6 61. f6 when Black resigned. (Paragua – Kaliakhmet, New York, 2024) 6) 23. ... Ne3 Black demolishes White's kingside. 24. fxe3 Bxe3+ 25. Nf2 Ne4 Pin and win! 26. Rf1 Nxf2 27. Rxf2 Qe4 Black's precision continues: 28. Nf3 Rc2 29. Qd1 h6 30. Qd8+ Kh7 31. Bd4 Bxf2+ 32. Bxf2 Qxe2 Black broke through, and White resigned here. (Javakhishvili – Paragua, New York, 2024)
