


FIDE WORLD RAPID & BLITZ, PT. 11
Today's puzzles all feature games of
GM Alexander Lenderman, a local
New Yorker who had a strong FIDE
World Blitz Championship, finishing

with an $8\frac{1}{2}/13$ score and six wins against fellow GMs.

In our **example**, Lenderman avoided danger to preserve winning chances against world number six GM Nodirbek Abdusattorov. White avoaided the poisoned pawn, choosing **39. Qc8+!** instead of 39. Qxb5??, when 39. ... Bc5 wins for Black: 40. Nh3 Qe1+ 41. Ng1 Qxg1 mate. Note that 39. Bxf6 Bc5 40. Qc8+ Nf8 also wins for Black. After **39. ... Kg7 40. Qc2 Qa7 41. Qc1**

White is better. See next month's *Chess Life* to see how he converted.





SOLUTIONS

1) 34. Rxg5+ and Black resigned, as 34. ... hxg5 35. Qxg5+ Kh7
Know your mating patterns: 35. ...
Kf7 36. Qg7 mate. 36. Qg7 mate.
(Lenderman – Raja, New York, 2024) 2) 32. e6! A fatal discovery.
32. ... g5 33. Qxf5 Qxe6 We reach the previous puzzle. 3) 57. Bb5 A simple move, but an important principle. The greedy 57. Kc6? Nxa4 58. Kb5 also wins the b-pawn, but too slowly! 57. ... Ne6 58. Kc6 Nf4

59. Bf1 Ke6 60. Kxb6 Kxe5 61. Kxa5 Kd6 62. Kb6 and White went on to win. (Lenderman – Sarana, New York, 2024) 4) 60. ... Qf4 Stunning counterplay. 61. b8=Q Qxh4+ 62. Kg2 Qh2+ The e4-bishop is poorly placed, so White resigned in light of 63. Kf3 Qf2 mate. (Lenderman – Sevian, New York, 2024) 5) 18. Bxa3 Patience! The fork is still there! 18. ... Be6? This loses on the spot, but even the best move, 18. ... Bxe4 is met by 19. Nxe4 with a

bleak position for Black. 19. Nxe6 fxe6 20. exd5 exd5 21. Rad1 White continues to prey on the loose pieces. (Lenderman – Shankland, New York, 2024) 6) 21. Rxb7 These simplification tactics are key to smooth victories. White played 21. Rxc8+ and went on to win ... 106 moves later! 21. ... Rxb7 22. Ba6 Rbc7 23. Bxc8 Rxc8 24. Nb1 With the bishop pinned and Ke2-d3 next, White is winning. (Lenderman – Al-Tarboush, New York, 2024)
