

## PAN-AMERICAN JUNIOR CHAMPS Today's puzzles come from the 2025 Pan-American Junior Championship. IM Jason Liang won gold and a GM norm, and fellow Americans IM

Nico Chasin and WGM Zoey Tang finished 2nd and 3rd, respectively.

Our **example** comes from Tang, who earned an IM norm as well. Under pressure, her opponent tried to force a queen trade with **26. Qc1?** Instead, 26. Qd2 Qxd3 27. Qxd3 Bxd3 was hard to evaluate, so rather than evaluate 28. e5 Bxe2 29. Rxd8 Rxd8 30. exf6, White hallucinated a concrete "bail-out" with **26. ... Qxe2 27. Rxa6 Nxe4** overlooking that the d3-pawn is pinned! After **28. Kh2** 

## Nxg3! 29. Ra7 Qe5, White resigned shortly in Melian – Tang.





## **SOLUTIONS**

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1) 50. Qa8+ White forces mate before Black can push the d-pawn. 50. ... Kc7 51. Rc6+ Kd7 The key pattern, with Black's e7-bishop clogging the escape route. 52. Qxc8 mate. (Tang – Mou, Paraguay, 2025) 2) 31. ... Qg2+ Another thematic mating net. 32. Kh4 Qh2+ Forcing White's kings towards the pawns. 33. Kg5 h6 mate (Torales – Park, Paraguay, 2025) 3) 34. ... Qxf4 Deflection! White resigned

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in light of 35. Qxf4 Re1 36. Qf1
Rxf1 mate. (Campos Gomez –
Park, Paraguay, 2025) 4) 15. Nxc5
Tactically astute, although 15. Bxc5
achieves the same result. 15. ...
dxc5 16. d6! Discovering pressure
on the hanging a8-rook. 16. ...
Qc8 17. dxe7 and Black resigned
shortly. (Johnson – Martinez
Flores, Paraguay, 2025) 5) 19. Bxa6
Overload! 19. ... Nxa6 Deflection!
Or 19. ... Rxa6 20. Rxc5! wins, even
though Black regains the piece after

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20. ... Bxc5 21. Qxa6 Bxd4 because of 22. Qxe6+ Kh8 23. Qxd5 leaving White with a deadly passer. 20. Nxe6 Winning an important pawn, with threats of e5-e6 and on the d5-pawn to follow. (Brito Carrascal – Namala, Paraguay, 2025) 6) 106. Kc8! Be honest, how much time did you spend calculating 106. Bc5+ first? Unable to stop both Bd6-c5 mate and Bd6-b8 mate next move, Black resigned. (Liang – Reyes Zavaleta, Paraguay, 2025)

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
