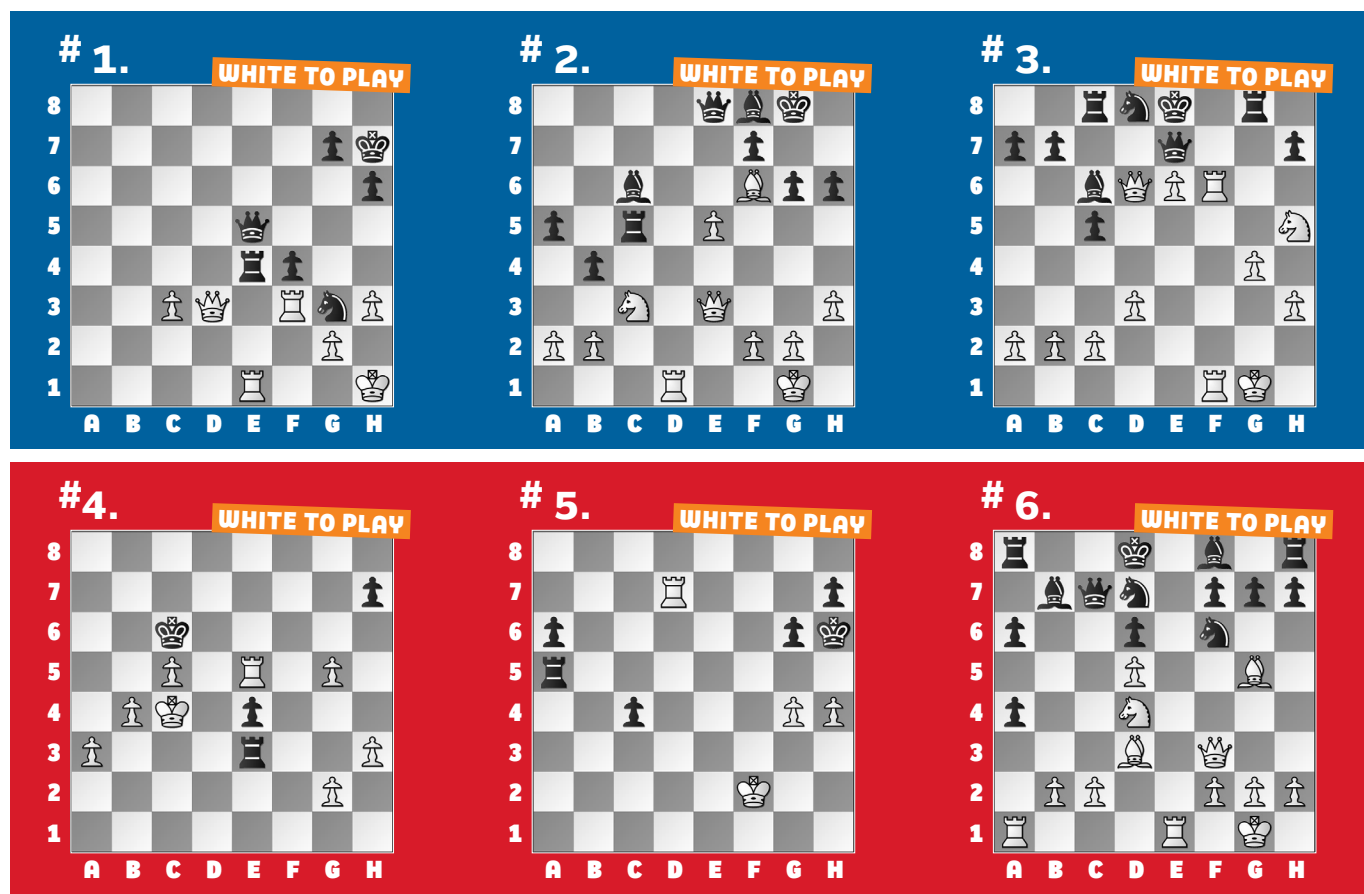
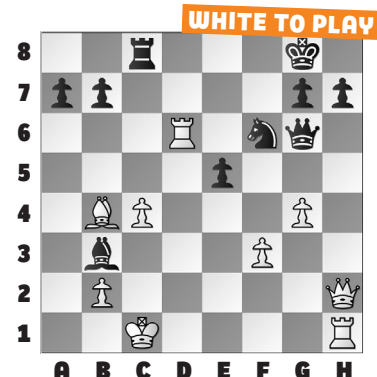


WORLD CADETS CHAMPS, PT. 2

Today's puzzles continue our series on the **2025 FIDE World Cadets Cup** from earlier this month, where defensive technique was crucial.

In our **example**, White needed to focus on defense rather than attack. By playing **27. Qd2??**, White neither closed down the c-file nor kept White's d2-square free for the king! Instead, 27. c5! was necessary, putting the burden on Black. Black can try 27. ... e4 28. f4, but now White can play for Qh2-d2 and a back rank attack without fear of counterplay along the c-file. But after the game move, **27. ... Rxc4+ 28. Bc3 Ra4!** must have come as a

shock, finding a new line of attack in Guntaka – Manchanda.



SOLUTIONS

1) 51. Rxg3 Removing the guard! The e4-rook is pinned, crucially. (Paragiri – Elemes, Batumi, 2025)

2) 36. Rd8 Removing the guard through an X-ray! Black's only queen move was 36. ... Qe6 when 37. Qxc5 wins, so **Black resigned** soon. (Guo – Yang, Batumi, 2025)

3) Black resigned, as: **27. Rf7 Qxd6 28. Nf6** is mate. (Manchanda – Turdybay, Batumi, 2025) **4) 42. Re7!** Suddenly, b4-b5+ is mate. **42. ...**

Rc3+ Nothing else avoids mate, and **Black resigned** shortly. (Aravinthan – Samanta, Batumi, 2025) **5) 46. g5+ Kh5** If not for the g4-square, Rd7xh7+ would be mate. **47. Kg3** But now mate is threatened! **47. ... h6** What else? Likely, Black was banking on 47. ... Ra3+ to remove the king's defense of the h4-pawn. However, 48. Kf4 does not remove the mate threat, and 48. ... Kxh4?? 49. Rxh7 mate is no better. **48. Rh7 Rxc4+** Nothing else stops mate! In

the game, **Black resigned** after 48. ... Ra3+ 49. Kf4 with mate to follow. (Ioseliani – Paragiri, Batumi, 2025) **6) 14. Nc6+** A thematic attacking sequence after a Nc3-d5 sac in the Najdorf Sicilian. **14. ... Kc8** This doesn't work, but neither did 14. ... Bxc6 15. dxc6 Ne5. **15. Bxf6 Bxc6** Black tries to keep material. Or 15. ... Nxf6 16. Bf5+ forces 16. ... Nd7 17. Re8+ wins. **16. Re8+ Kb7 17. dxc6+ Qxc6 18. Be4** Winning! (Bulgak – Sawhney, Batumi, 2025)
