

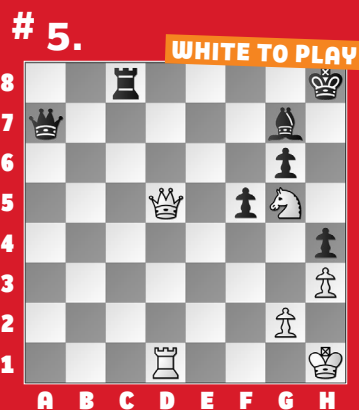
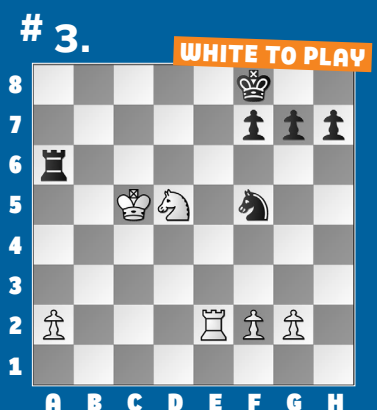
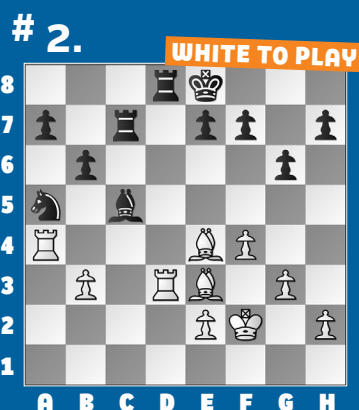
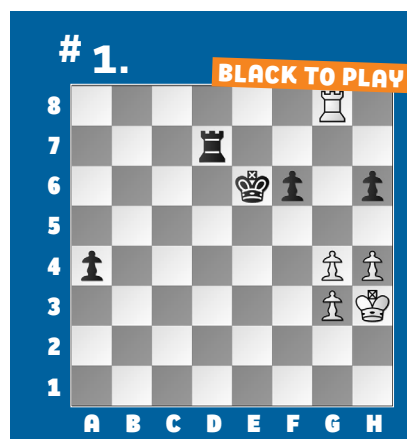
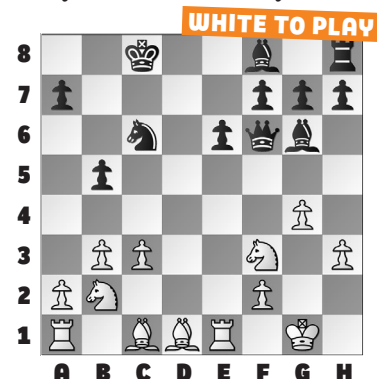
2025 FIDE GRAND SWISS, PT. 1

We begin our series on the **FIDE Grand Swiss**, with two Candidates spots up for grabs in each of the Open and Women's events. WGM

Sabina Foisor curated a number of fantastic puzzles, so let's get to it!

In our **example**, White showed the importance of king safety with **19. Bg5 Qxc3 20. Rc1!** Forcing **20. ... Qxb2 21. Rxc6+ Kb7 22. Ne5** when White's king hunt would continue with **Bd1-f3**, so Black played **22. ... Qxe5 23. Rxe5 Kxc6** to remove some attackers. And yet, despite being pawn-up without queens, Black's king is still too exposed. Play continued **24. Bf3+ Kb6 25. Bd8+**

Ka6 26. a4! and the attack raged on in Suleymanli – Karthikeyan.



SOLUTIONS

1) 52. ... Ra7 One of the most important endgame techniques! White can stop the a-pawn, but only by pacifying the rook. After **53. Re8+ Kf7 54. Re2 a3 55. Ra2 Ra4, White resigned.** (Kollars – Pranav, Samarkand, 2025) **2) 32. Bxc5** Overload! Not **32. b4 Bxe3+** when Black escapes the fork. **32. ... Rxc5** If **32. ... bxc5 33. Rxa5** was the point. **33. b4** With the fork, **Black resigned.** (Praggnanandhaa

– Zemlyanskii, Samarkand, 2025)

3) 37. Nc7! Forking the rook and back rank mate. **37. ... Rc6+** But did you see this? **38. Kxc6** The resulting pawn-and-knight endgame wins for White after **... Nf5-d4+**, but you only get credit if you saw this resource. (Balabayeva – M. Muzychuk, Samarkand, 2025) **4) 25. Qf5! g6 26. hxg6 fxg6** Or **26. ... hxg6 27. Qh3** threatens mate. **27. Qe6+** and **Black resigned**, due to **27. ... Rf7 28. Rxh7.** (Assaubayeva – Narva,

Samarkand, 2025) **5) 61. Qe6!** A fork on the rook and the g6-square! **61. ... Qc5 62. Qxg6 Kg8 63. Qh7+** and **Black resigned** due to **Ng5-e6+**. (Wafa – Danielian, Samarkand, 2025) **6) 39. ... Rg1+** A bizarre case of a rook forking a king and rook! But it's immune to capture! **40. Kh2** Not **40. Rxg1 Qxg1** mate. **40. ... Bxf4+** and White resigned, as **41. Qxf4 Rxf1** puts Black piece-up after **42. Be4+ fxe4 43. Qxf1.** (Kuzubov – Yakubboev, Samarkand, 2025)
