

WORLD CADET CHAMPS, PT. 3


This week's exercises continue our series on the **2025 FIDE World Cadet Championships**, featuring the top players in the Under-8, -10, and -12

age categories, both Open and Girls.

In our **example**, we are reminded of the importance of king safety when calculating. White played **12. Bxh6?** when simply playing 12. 0-0 would be simpler. But after the greedy move, White ran into **12.... Nxe4! 13. Nxe4 Qh4+** with tempo on the bishop! After **14. g3 Qxh6 15. Qxh6 Bxh6 16. Nf6+ Kg7 17. Nd5**, White has compensation for the pawn, but Black is no longer restricted without any white pawns

in the center. White did later win in Ling – Zhauynbay.





SOLUTIONS

1) 23. Ne6+ White uses discovered checks to the win the knight: 23. ... Kc8 24. Nf4+ Kd8 25. Nxd5 and White won six moves later. (Chen – Hernandez Lopez, Almaty, 2025) 2) 29. Qxe3! Using the pin on the d4-pawn! 29. ... Bxc4 30. Qxe5+ f6 31. Qd6! The best square, hitting both the d- and f-pawns. (Begmuratova – Li, Almaty, 2025) 3) 31. ... Be5+ The discovered attack wins material. Black's 31. ... Rb8?? was too slow,

and White went on to win. **32. Nxe5 Qxc6** Most likely, Black stopped calculating here, as the queen was defended, but... **33. Nxc6 Rxd5**The rook hangs and Black wins.
(Bayramova – Atassi, Almaty, 2025) **4) 80. c4+!** White wants to play g6-g7-g8=Q, and Black wanted ...
Bb1-a2-(x)g8. Now, regardless of whether Black captures, it will take Black a fourth turn to reach the g8-square, meaning they're too late to stop White's g-pawn from

running in for the touchdown!

Black resigned. (Obidjonov – Ling,
Almaty, 2025) 5) 36. Bh7+ Sacrificing
a bishop to win a bishop is unusual,
but loose pieces drop off! 36....

Kxh7 37. Rxf7+ Kg6 38. Rxd7 White
doubled their investment! (Borshch
– Zhu, Almaty, 2025) 6) 26. Ne6+

Kf7 The fork is easy to see, but isn't
White's queen also hanging? 27.

Qxc5! There it is! White wins the
Exchange. (Saltkhutsishvili – Zhou,
Almaty, 2025)
