

NORTH AMERICAN JUNIORS, PT. 2

This week's puzzle continues our series on the **2025 North American Junior Championships**, held last month in Mexico.


In our **example**, Black used a familiar theme of smothered mate to force a superior endgame after **18.... Qb6+ 19. Qd4 c5! 20. Qxd5**

c4+! 21. Qd4 Qxd4+ 22. cxd4 cxd3 when White played 23. Rfd1 as 23. fxe4 fxe4, with the connected passers, would be decisive, but after 23. ... Nf6 Black went on to win in Duarte Cramer – Fei.

If **19. Kh1 Nf2+** then White is forced to play **20. Rxf2** as 20. Kg1 Nh3+ 21. Kh1 Qg1+ 22. Rxg1 Nf2 is

mate, but **20. ... Qxf2** puts Black up a healthy Exchange.





SOLUTIONS

1) 12. ... Bf5 The queen is almost trapped, and its one escape square is grim. 13. Qf3 e4 And now Black wins a full rook on a1! (Venkatesh – Campos Gorgonio, Mexico, 2025, variation) 2) 34. Qxg7+ Winning a pawn and simplifying to a won endgame. 34. ... Kxg7 35. Ne6+ Kf7 36. Nxc5 and White won in 33 more moves. (Yan – Fei, Mexico, 2025) 3) 37. ... Bc4+! Instead, Black erred with 37. ... Ra1 allowing 38.

Rb2! when the second rook breaks through. **38. Kc2** Or 38. Kxc4 Rxd2 is even better for Black. **38. ... Ra1** Only now, with White's d-rook cut off from the queenside! A very subtle and clever in-between move that makes the difference between a loss and a draw. (Barrera Garcia – Danduprolu, Mexico, 2025, analysis) **4) 25. ... Rxc1** Move order doesn't matter: 25. ... Qh2+ 26. Kf1 Rxc1 works too. **26. Rxc1 Qh2+ 27. Kf1 Qh1+ 28. Ke2 Qxc1**

and White resigned five moves later. (Venkatesh – Johnson, Mexico, 2025) 5) 30. b4! and Black resigned. The point is 30. ... Qa6 31. b5 wins the rook, while 30. ... cxb4 also drops the rook. (Hernandez Diaz – Yan, Mexico, 2025) 6) 42. ... Rg2! Going for mate on h2! 43. Nxg2 fxg2+ 44. Kg1 Or 44. Kxg2 e3+! wins the queen. 44. ... gxf1=Q+ and White resigned shortly due to the tremendous pressure. (Johnson – Montes Orozco, Mexico, 2025)
